### Political scientist Carmines to reflect on 2020 election – which will be over!



When retirees gather Nov. 11, they will hear from **Edward G**. **Carmines**, Warner O. Chapman Professor of Political Science. "It will be the week after the election, and he'll have plenty to talk about," says IURA Program Chair **Doug Porter**.

Ed's main research interest is American politics, especially elections, political behavior, and public opinion. "I am currently studying how the public is responding to the increasing ideological polarization between our major political parties," he says. Another research interest is the role that voters' policy preferences play in their electoral decisions.

After earning his Ph.D. at SUNY Buffalo in 1975, Ed came to IU as a visiting assistant professor. He never left, except for stints as a visiting professor at Oxford and as a fellow at Stanford and Princeton. Since 2001 he has been director of IU's Center on American Politics. He became research director at the Center on Congress in 2003.

An elected fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the American Association for the Advancement of Science, he has received the AMOCO Award for Distinguished Teaching from Indiana University.

He enjoys reading, traveling, watching sports, and playing bocce ball on the beaches at Cape Cod.

## United Way imagines better normal


Retirees soon will receive information in the mail about the 2020 United Way campaign. **Sherrie Shuler**, resource development director at United Way of Monroe County, emphasized the important role that retirees play. "Your membership has a significant impact on what the United Way is able to do in the community," she told retirees via Zoom at the Oct. 14 meeting of the IURA.

"When everything else was shutting down in March, we were ramping up," she said. "We sprang into action." A priority was setting up a recovery center for those experiencing homelessness along with COVID-19. A special COVID relief fund allowed United Way agencies to help people better weather the epidemic. For example, the Hoosier Hills Food Bank has distributed 5 million pounds of food so far this year.

United Way's kickoff campaign asked people to Reimagine 2020, to reimagine a *better* normal for people in Monroe, Owen, and Greene counties. Sherrie invites people with questions to contact her directly: <u>sherrie@monroeunitedway.org</u>, (423) 693-3906.

Last year retirees contributed \$283,000, surpassing its \$250,000 goal. IURA board member **Jim Grandorf**, who co-chairs United Way's Vanguard effort, has set \$275,000 as the IURA's goal for this year. Other members of the IURA team are IURA Secretary **Perry Maull** and **Eileen Schellhammer**.

#### Gonzalez: Education is the answer



**Gerardo Gonzalez** believes in education. Dean of the School of Education from 2000 to 2015, he wrote a book about his own journey to the American dream. Its subtitle: *The Power of Education*. Gerardo began his talk to retirees on Oct. 14 with the above quotation from Nelson Mandela.

Gerardo's future was anything but preordained. He was 11 when his family left Cuba in February 1962, one of the last families to be able to leave legally, with the state's permission. Many Cuban refugees flooded Miami, intending to return when the Castro regime failed. Speaking no English, Gerardo was sent to a school where he was suspended for speaking Spanish. "The teachers resented Latino students," he said. He was placed on the vocational track and, because of social promotion, graduated from high school. He had no thought of – or interest in – college.

But a friend suggested community college, and, thanks to the junior college's open door policy, he was admitted. "I learned from my failures," he says. He was the first in his family to attend college.

Gerardo credits two professors in the University of Florida's Department of Psychology for their encouragement as he earned his bachelor's and Ph.D. degrees. "Their mentoring made it possible for me to succeed," he says.

His advice to other "voyagers" trying to fit in:

- Remember your roots.
- Never give up.
- Seek mentors.
- Trust serendipity.
- Ask questions.

- Pursue your passion
- Give back.

Gerardo's book, *A Cuban Refugee's Journey to the American Dream*, has sold well. It made Amazon's best-sellers list for Hispanic and Latino biographies. "I grew up in a family that told stories," he says. He wrote his story to "honor and celebrate the sacrifice of my parents."

Gerardo remembers well his impressions when he returned to Cuba 40 years later as the leader of a People to People group of IU alumni. IURA members **Frank Lester** and **Diana Lambdin** were part of that group. Frank had to visit a medical facility because of ankle problems. He was seen immediately, and there was no charge.

Cuba has, perhaps, the best medical care in the world, Gerardo agreed, and listed its points of pride: education, the arts, and health care. But, he said, Cubans say there was a tradeoff: "We lost breakfast, lunch, and dinner." The economy is in shambles.

## **Spotlight on Martha McCarthy**

One of the people on Zoom Oct. 14 was Martha McCarthy, Chancellor's Professor Emerita at IU and now a Presidential Professor at Loyola Marymount University. We asked her to describe her reasons for belonging to the IURA.

I've been an IURA member since I retired from IU in 2011 after teaching law and policy courses and

serving in various administrative roles for 35 years. I left IU on June 30 and became a faculty member at



Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles on July 1. I definitely flunked retirement! I'm still at LMU (working remotely right now), and I live in beautiful Marina del Rey. Every time I think about retiring (again), LMU does something to pull me back.

Of course my heart remains at Indiana University.
